2. My Fellow Co-Workers


3. My Own Well Being

FALL PREVENTION

The workplace must be assessed before each assigned job for potential fall hazards. When fall hazards cannot be eliminated then the use of a guardrail and fall-protection system and administrative controls must be used. There are three basic guidelines to be used if an employee could fall and used in order when planning work at elevated heights. These guidelines will help in keeping you safe when you're working at heights ... be sure you use them!

- 1. Fall prevention methods, such as guardrails.
- 2. Fall protection systems, such as a restraint system, positioning system and or fall-arrest system.
- Distance protection, providing a safe distance from the unprotected sides and edges. (maintenance work ONLY)



4. Fall prevention plan, which are administrative controls that rely on special training and work practices.

<u>A restraint device</u> is a system that is rigged to allow workers to move only as far as the sides of the work area and prevents the wearer from reaching a fall hazard. The anchor must withstand a load of 800 pounds or a structure that cannot be moved or pulled over. No rescue plan is needed.

<u>A positioning device</u> is a system that shall be rigged in such a way that an employee cannot free fall more than 2 feet. The anchor must withstand a load of 3,000 pounds. A rescue plan is required.

<u>A fall-arrest device</u> is a system that shall be rigged in such a way that an employee cannot free fall more than 6 feet. The anchor must withstand a load of 5,000 pounds. A rescue plan is required.

Don't forget to always inspect your equipment before each use. If the equipment doesn't have its colored tag for its annual inspection, return the equipment to your supervisor. Remember, wearing a harness should not be your first choice to protect yourself from a fall, but, if fall protection is needed, wear it properly, inspect it, be trained and connect to the right anchor.

Cell Phone Distractions



The use of cell phones on job sites, while sometimes a necessity of communication, present a real hazard when it comes to distracting workers from safety practices.

Cell phones are powerful tools for sending and receiving valuable information. When used appropriately they add value to our lives, but when used inappropriately they can create workplace hazards that may not otherwise exist.

Cell phones divert workers attention away from what could be a critical moment. Workers should restrict cell phone use to during breaks or after shifts in order to avoid accidents. A lack of concentration when it is needed most is what normally results in fatal consequences. Restricting phone use while working also will ensure quality of work increase and promote team work among workers. But most importantly it will reduce the amount of accidents on site, especially falls which are the most common cause of death and injury on job sites.





Distracted Driving Awareness

In 2019, The National Safety Council conducted a survey of the driving behaviors and attitudes of 2,000 Americans.

- 37% of respondents aged 18 to 34 said they felt a high degree of pressure to respond to work-related messages while driving, compared to 25% of the national average among all age groups.
- Parents with young children were more likely to be distracted while driving (87%) than were adults with no small children (74%).
- One in three drivers admitted to taking photos while driving.

The study also uncovered many variations in distracted driving behavior based on the operating system of the cell phone the driver used.

- 16% of iPhone users said they never get distracted while driving vs. 23% of Android users and 38% of other cell phone users.
- iPhone and Apple Car play users are more than twice as likely than Android users to video-chat, use social media, stream shows on Netflix and take photos and videos while driving.
- 10% of iPhone users admitted watching videos on YouTube while driving, while 4% of Android users admitted to doing the same.

Its up to each of us to take responsibility for our actions

- You're the only person who can control your behavior behind the wheel.
- Every driving decision you make has consequences, for you and others.
- The consequences of a poor driving decision can range from a traffic violation to a costly crash, a life-changing injury or even a fatality.
- Make it your goal to be a distraction-free role model for other drivers.
